Learning Outcomes for the MFA in Creative Writing and Media Arts

Graduates of the MFA Program in Creative Writing & Media Arts will be able to demonstrate:

- Mastery of poetics or storytelling craft through the creation of a full-length manuscript of poetry, fiction, non-fiction, plays, or screenplays that are deliberately crafted, structurally sound, and complete;
- Effective problem-solving and revision strategies in the composition of poems, fiction, non-fiction, plays, or screenplays;
- A deliberate, masterful command of language, including style, grammar, and mechanics, and a distinct voice;
- Proficiency in at least one genre outside of their primary field and the ability to apply the techniques of their secondary genres to the work they produce in their primary field of study;
- Sophisticated critical analyses of literary texts, including an understanding of how a text displays
 a writer's artistic techniques and the ability to incorporate those techniques into their own
 writing; and
- Thorough knowledge of the literary traditions of their primary genre and the ability to situate their own work within current literary conversations.

Advising Guidelines

Always refer to the course catalog for the most up-to-date information about degree requirements. These guidelines are meant to address common questions that arise from MFA students and their advisors.

Total Credit Hours: 42 credit hours are required to complete the MFA program, with at least 27 credit hours completed at the graduate level, and at least 33 credit hours completed at UMKC. With approval from your advisor, you may transfer in up to 6 credit hours of graduate coursework from another institution or another program at UMKC.

Graduate vs. Undergraduate Courses: Always enroll in 5000-level classes when possible; only enroll in 300- or 400-level classes when necessary, allowable, and approved by your advisor. You must complete additional work (additional reading, projects, papers, etc.) and earn a B- (2.7) or better for 300- or 400-level courses to be accepted for graduate credit. A maximum of 15 credit hours at the 300- or 400-level may be counted toward the MFA.

Getting the Most from the Program: We recommend you take at least one workshop and one literature course per semester. We recommend you take a writing workshop in your primary genre in your first semester of the program. You are encouraged to work with as many faculty as possible, but can take the same class up to three times with approval of your advisor and the creative writing director.

Primary Genre: 12 credit hours (4 classes) of writing workshops are required in your primary genre. Writing workshop courses include 401/5501, 402/5502, 432/5532, 435/5535, 436/5536, 437/5537, 5550K, 5555, and 475/5575. Other courses that can count for writing workshop credit are internships (English 448/5548, 449A/5549A, or 449B/5549B), screenwriting (Comm-St 454/5554, or 354 – contact the instructor to determine whether 5591 is appropriate), or playwriting (Theater 437 or 438).

Interdisciplinary Component: 6 credit hours (2 classes) of writing workshops outside of your core genre are required for the interdisciplinary component. You may take two interdisciplinary workshops in the same genre, or two different genres.

Literature: 12 credit hours (4 classes) of literature coursed are required; 15 credit hours are recommended (5 classes).

Thesis: 6 credit hours of 5598A are required, typically completed in your last two semesters of the program. You will be assigned a thesis advisor and you will ask two secondary readers to serve on your thesis committee. Details are included in the 5598A Guidelines.

5519 Teaching Writing is required for all GTAs and counts as a literature course. This course can serve as an elective for non-GTAs.

5500 Graduate Study in English is not required, but can count as a literature course.

Foreign Language Requirement: By the time of graduation from the M.F.A. program, students must have completed one year (two university semesters) of a single foreign language. Alternatively, the foreign language requirement may be satisfied by scoring a "C" on the final exam of the first-year, second-semester course in foreign language. Previous undergraduate coursework may be used to satisfy this requirement.

Students choose to focus on two or more of the following genres:

English: Poetry, Fiction, Creative Nonfiction

Communications Studies: Screenwriting Theatre: Playwriting

Foreign Language Requirement: By the time of graduation from the M.F.A. program, students must have completed one year (two university semesters) of a foreign language. Alternatively, the foreign language requirement may be satisfied by scoring a "C" on the final exam of the first-year, second-semester course in a foreign language. Previous undergraduate course work may be used to satisfy this requirement. Old English may be used to satisfy one semester of the requirement.

The interdisciplinary MFA in Creative Writing and Media Arts allows students the option of developing their writing focus in the Department of Theatre or in the Department of Communication Studies. Students must complete at least six hours outside their writing focus area including one creative writing, craft workshop or production course.

Thesis directors may approve courses in other departments that may be highly valuable for particular student programs, e.g., History for documentary film, Foreign Language for translation, Philosophy for aesthetics and theoretical/experimental approaches, and Art.

5598A MFA Thesis Guidelines and Schedule

Committee

Part of the requirement for the interdisciplinary MFA in Creative Writing and Media Arts is the thesis, completed near the end of your program of study. You will enroll in two semesters of English 5598A MFA Thesis to receive credit while you develop your thesis. The thesis will consist of your own writing and will be expected to contain new work created for the thesis, and may contain earlier work written for class or outside of class.

The thesis will be evaluated by a thesis committee, comprised of three members:

- 1. A thesis director from the MFA faculty
- 2. A second member from the MFA faculty
- 3. A third member (non-MFA faculty) selected from the English Department, another UMKC department, or another institution

At least one committee member must be from the English Department. All committee members should be graduate faculty.

Your thesis director is the person with whom you share multiple drafts (two or more) of your thesis. After you have received feedback from your thesis director and incorporated changes, then you should submit a revised draft to your secondary readers. Secondary readers generally only read your thesis once.

All thesis committee members (director and secondary readers) should be given at least three weeks to review your thesis prior to your oral defense. If you need to make other arrangements, you will need to negotiate that with individual faculty members.

Manuscript

Your thesis will be a publishable or producible manuscript of one of the following:

- A book of poems (48-80 pages, single spaced)
- A book of short stories or creative nonfiction essays (180 pages minimum, double spaced)
- A novel or novel-length nonfiction book (180-page minimum, double spaced)
- A full-length or several one-act plays
- A feature screenplay (95-120 pages) or a series bible and two 1-hour episodes (20 pages and two 45-page episodes)
- A full-length cross-genre work, with Committee Chair permission

Critical Introduction

MFA students are required to write a formal, 5-page critical introduction to their theses. Please respond to the following questions in your introduction, which must be submitted with your thesis:

- Discuss in detail the revision process for your thesis, including specific challenges and ways that
 you solved these issues. For poetry, you may choose to discuss in detail the revision process for
 several poems.
- Please comment on how the literature, film, and/or plays you have studied in creative writing, literature, and/or media arts courses at UMKC have influenced your writing and helped to guide the development of your thesis.

Procedure

Students in the MFA program must complete 6 credit hours of English 5598A during their final year of study. These hours must be split over two semesters (three hours each). If you wish to complete the thesis in a single semester, you need permission from all faculty members serving on your thesis committee.

The semester before you begin your thesis:

- You will be assigned a faculty member to serve as your thesis director
- Ask two additional faculty members to serve as secondary readers
- Have the thesis director and secondary readers sign the MFA Thesis Committee Consent Form (obtain from and return to the English Department Office)
- Review formatting guidelines for the MFA thesis as outlined on the SGS website:
 https://sgs.umkc.edu/current-students/thesis-dissertation-guidelines/. Most formatting guidelines are automatically waived for a creative thesis. The formatting requirements that apply to the MFA thesis are title page, abstract, approval page, table of contents, vita, and margins.
- Attend a Thesis and Dissertation Formatting Workshop with SGS (recorded sessions are available online; in-person sessions are offered in September and January)

^{*}Formatting: While most formatting guidelines are automatically waived for a creative thesis, you must include a Preliminary Approval of Thesis Form with your thesis (week 7). Please note: bibliographic references may be omitted; only the formatting requirements of title page, abstract, approval page, table of contents, vita, and margins must be met.

^{**}Embargo: You are strongly encouraged to request an embargo on the release of your thesis through MoSpace and ProQuest. For MoSpace, simply complete the Thesis Dissertation Delayed Release (Embargo) Request Form and submit it with your thesis for formatting review. For ProQuest, select the maximum embargo (2 years) when you upload your final thesis, then email ProQuest (disspub@proquest.com) to request a permanent embargo that will take effect when the 2-year embargo expires. When you receive a response from ProQuest, you will know your embargo request was granted and that only UMKC affiliates with active passwords can view your thesis.
